

In December 2012, my son John and I climbed to the summit of Kalapathar (18,519 feet) in the Nepalese Himalayas and gazed up at Mount Everest (29,029 feet). Air was thin and legs were weary, as we celebrated the success of our nine day trek with great jubilation. Step by step (sometimes baby sets with rest in between those) I was able to accomplish our goal. Even the athletic young can't reach these heights too quickly for fear of altitude sickness. It wisely takes time to acclimatize. My many months of preparation had prepared me well for the often required eight hours a day trekking.



Elder David A. Bednar writes: Increasing physical stamina requires sustained focus and frequent effort, as opposed to occasional or intermittent bursts of intense activity. In like manner, if you and I are focused and consistent in developing our spiritual capacity, we can slowly and steadily strengthen our minds and hearts to discern, accept, and employ gospel truth; we can increase our spiritual capacity to detect and avoid temptation; and we can increase our determination and our ability to endure, through the enabling power of the Atonement, any challenges we encounter.



Elder Bednar continues: We can avoid or overcome unsustainable spiritual spurting as we employ the Lord's pattern of small and simple things and become valiant disciples with strong, spiritual stamina---blessed with capacity to endure to the end with faith in the Savior. (Power to Become, pages 119 & 121)

### Peace



Fathers want *Peace* for their family.

In the hymn, Where can I turn to peace?, the answer is given, "He, only One." Jesus invites each of us to seek out and then pass through the gate which He stands watch over. Heaven is separated from hell by a fence of fixed and eternal laws that bar the unjust from the just, the abusers from the innocent, and the lawbreakers from the righteous. The humble seeker of peace covenants to obey the laws of happiness and is permitted to enter into heaven's relief.

#### Fathers -- which side of the fence do you want for your family?

Peace is both deeply personal and publicly obvious. While the suffering in Gethsemane was a deeply personal experience for Jesus, dying on the cross made His personal commitment publicly obvious. Among the final instructions to His disciplines He said: "Peace I leave with you, my peace I give unto you: not as the world giveth, give I unto you. Let not your heart be troubled, neither let it be afraid." (John 14:27)

Fathers, look in a mirror, then look around you.

Are you seeing the peace Jesus spoke of?

If other's ways aren't working then come and try His way.

Jesus said, "If ye love me, keep my commandments." (John 14:15)

He also said.

"Therefore all things whatsoever ye would that men should do to you, do ye even so to them: for this is the law and the prophets. Enter ye in at the strait gate: for wide is the gate, and broad is the way, that

leadeth to destruction, and many there be which go in thereat: Because strait is the gate, and narrow is the way, which leadeth unto life, and few there be that find it."

(Matthew 7:12-14)

## Face the Truth

Fathers need to Face the Truth and teach their family to do the same. So, what is the truth?

Jesus Christ answered this question for us when He said, "I am the way, the truth, and the life" (John 14:6). Jesus Christ showed us the way. Truth doesn't change. Truth is the same yesterday, today, and forever. Truth retains its integrity. Truth dwells in light.

Why is knowing the truth so important?

Fathers want to be there for their family. They want to meet their children's needs and help them succeed. Again Jesus taught, "I am the vine, ye are the branches: He that abideth in me, and I in him, the same bringeth forth much fruit: for without me ye can do nothing." (John 15:5) As fathers live the way Jesus taught, through keeping His commandments,

they will be blessed and bring "forth much fruit" or in other words bring forth many good things for their family.

Fathers – be honest, truthful, and forthright with yourself and with your wife and children. Never lie or misrepresent the truth. Make needed changes, repent, and always obey God's teachings. Admit that there are negative consequences and seek to avoid them. Identify positive consequences and seek to achieve them.

How can I know the truth?

Ask God what you should do. He knows what works. "If any of you lack wisdom, let him ask of God, that giveth to all men liberally, and upbraideth not; and it shall be given him." (James 1:5) By following the example of Jesus, fathers will pray to their Heavenly Father and "thy Father which seeth in secret shall reward thee openly." (Matthew 6:5-13).

Joseph Smith Jr. beheld a heavenly vision and writes:

"The first thing that I can recollect was a voice speaking unto me, calling me by name. I looked up, and beheld the same messenger standing over my head, surrounded by light as before. He then again related unto me all that he had related to me the previous night, and commanded me to go to my father and tell him

of the vision and commandments which I had received.

"I obeyed; I returned to my father in the field, and rehearsed the whole matter to him. He replied to me that it was of God, and told me to go and do as commanded by the messenger." (JS History 1:49-50)

It is notable that Joseph "obeyed" the heaven sent messenger, "rehearsed the whole matter" to his father, and followed his father's counsel to "do as [the messenger] commanded". Joseph's father was inspired in teaching his seventeen year old son to listen and to follow truth.

We can't tell where life will take us. What we can be sure of is that we will never regret the positive consequences that will adorn our journey throughout life when we keep Christ's commandments. As we Face the Truth, we will always walk in His light.

"40 And when he had thus spoken, he shewed them his hands and his feet.

"41 And while they yet believed not for joy, and wondered, he said unto them, Have ye here any meat?

"42 And they gave him a piece of a broiled fish, and of an honeycomb.

"43 And he took it, and did eat before them." (Luke 24:36-43).

When Discipline Starts



When does discipline start?

As a young father, of what came to be five rambunctious children, I began with a simple disciplining rule, If you do something wrong you'll get spanked. As I started growing up, I modified the rule to, If you do something wrong you'll get spanked three times...unless you lie or speak back to your mother--then you get four spanks. This worked pretty well.

Then one day I realized how angry I was becoming after my repeated warnings to obey went unheeded by our children. I remember getting their attention (yet again) and loudly saying, *I'm getting angry. See this hand. See how big this hand is.* And immediately went into the living room and sat down in a comfortable chair. I noticed two things. First, I began to calm down and feel greater control over myself. Second, I heard the kids start to obey. I seldom had to spank after that because I was learning to calm down enough to think of alternative ways of disciplining.

That's when I started using my head more and my hand less. I said to myself, I'm smarter than a two year old (who soon turned into a sixteen year old). How can I get her/him to do what is right? Ironically it's my oldest child who showed me a better way as I watched her discipline her children with a question, Do you want to go to bed now or after we read together? You can choose.

I have learned that **discipline starts with the father**, not with the child.

### **Choose To Serve**



Jesus said, "In my Father's house are many mansions...I go to prepare a place for you." (John 14:2).

In my mind, I picture the following story taking place after I die:

The great hall was more magnificent than words can express. The ceiling rose high above my head, was filled with light, and seemed to reach to eternity. Countless numbers of people were greeting and mingling one with another. Others were coming and going from various side rooms where laughter and talking could faintly be heard.

My guide quietly bade me to 'feel right at home', 'visit freely while awaiting judgment', then said before hurrying away, 'I'll return quickly.'

It didn't take me long to begin meeting people I had known during mortality. Former friends embraced me and welcomed me home.

Many wanted to learn about my experiences and were eager to tell me about what had happened during their time on earth.

Where were you born, they asked? Who were your parents? Did you marry? What work did you do? Did you die young or old? How did you die? For each question they asked me, I would asked them two.

After a while, I began to wonder from room to room and was astonished by the diversity. Some loudly and irreverently reminisced about their wild adventures and conquests in mortality. Others tearfully bemoaned wasted opportunities and unprofitable actions. Still others joyfully visited with family and friends. We were all 'waiting' in our own way for the judgment promised.

Occasionally we were interrupted with an invitation to serve. Requests went out to be a greeter, to help new arrivals find a relative, or to comfort an individual with concerns. I wanted to help so I volunteered to serve. I began listening to people with concerns. I listened, gave encouragement, and shared a few learning moments from my own life. Many were concerned about their loved ones still in morality.

By and by, I was asked if I would help greet little children who were leaving mortality in their infancy. Having a love for children, I quickly accepted this invitation and soon found myself in a much more glorious and beautiful place. I felt honored to greet these precious spirits and, with joyous reverence, led them into the arms of waiting progenitors.

In time, the reception hall stood quiet and empty. After a final invitation to serve was extended by the one who greeted me when I first arrived, the great doors to each room were closed and locked. Each person had freely chosen to remain in the room with those they enjoyed being with the most or to move on by giving additional service. Judgement had come.

Doctrine & Covenants 88:18 Therefore, it [the earth] must needs be sanctified from all unrighteousness, that it may be prepared for the celestial glory; 19 For after it hath filled the measure of its creation, it shall be crowned with glory, even with the presence

of God the Father; 20 That bodies who are of the celestial kingdom may possess it forever and ever; for, for this intent was it made and created, and for this intent are they sanctified.

The family of Adam and Eve is to prepare the earth, and themselves, to receive the "presence of God the Father..." in "the celestial kingdom...." Don't let the weeds, the work, or the temporary darkness take away your faith in the future.

### Dare to Stand Alone!



Fathers, teach your children that it often takes more courage not to join than it does to go along with the crowd.

"So many times young people are enticed to go to the very edge or even beyond it. [Where]...it is easy to be seriously injured or even die. Life is too precious to throw away in the name of excitement...."

"Each of us must take the responsibility for the moral decisions we make in life about how close we live to the edge. Lehi states: 'And because that they are redeemed from the fall they have become free forever, knowing good from evil; to act for themselves and not to be acted upon.' Being acted upon means somebody else is pulling the strings." - Acting for Ourselves and Not Being Acted Upon

When the crowd you're with starts pulling your strings to be immodest, dishonest, or take unhealthy risks, find a different crowd or stand alone if you must!

President Thomas S. Monson has said: "We live in a time when we are surrounded by much that is intended to entice us into paths which may lead to our destruction. To avoid such paths requires determination and courage." He also shared a childhood poem:

Dare to be a Mormon;
Dare to stand alone.
Dare to have a purpose firm;
Dare to make it known.

He adds one more insight: "May we ever be courageous and prepared to stand for what we believe, and if we must stand alone in the process, may we do so courageously, strengthened by the knowledge that in reality we are never alone when we stand with our Father in Heaven." - Dare to Stand Alone



## Be Praise Worthy



Fathers lead their family, first by example and then by instruction. As a result, no one is surprised when children begin to walk and talk like their father. However, learning is not so automatic for a blind or deaf child. For these children, body movements or voice recognition aren't independently learned and must be taught more overtly or translations provided. Most sighted and hearing fathers initially assume all children will automatically learn how to run and speak. They often take for granted that these skills must be learned.

American Sign Language: Worthy, Important, Value

To one degree or another, everyone's progress can be accelerated through personalized effort and praise for improvement. Similarly, qualities of character must be learned. Most children seem to automatically begin to exhibit personality traits (i.e., honesty, caring for others, and a willingness to share) of those around them. And yet here again, everyone's progress to develop strong and healthy values can be accelerated through personalized effort and sincere praise for improvement.



## Your Life Makes a Difference



Armstead Moffett
Birth:
Feb 7, 1814
Leesburg, Loudoun County, Virginia, USA

Death: Mar. 27, 1891 Eden, Weber County. Utah, USA

Does how you live your life make a difference? Read Armstead Moffett's obituary and then answer this question.

Deseret News, June 5, 1891, page 7:

MOFFETT. – The news of the death of Brother [Armstead] Moffett, which occurred at his residence in Huntsville, Weber county, at 4:35 a.m., [March] 27 1891, was not entirely unexpected by his numerous friends and relatives.... He was the son of Robert Moffett and Bethsina M. [McGeath]....

Brother Moffett was a man highly esteemed and respected by his friends and acquaintances for his sterling integrity, untiring energy and, above all, for his openhanded charity. No one ever vainly appealed to him for assistance, if it was in his power to grant it....

In 1835 he went to Columbiana Co., Ohio, where he resided for two years, and while there heard the Gospel, and he and his sister Elizabeth Jane, the only ones of his mother's children, embraced it; he was baptized by Lorenzo Barnes October 9, 1837, at Rochester, Columbiana County, Ohio. In the fall of 1837 moved with his mother and family, in company with Moses Buck of Richmond, Mo., and from there to Far West. From there he was called to [Adam-ondiahman], where he went in company with

Alexander McKay; after assisting there returned to Far West with A. Lyman and Jacob Scott.... he saw the army arrayed against the Mormons, and Joseph, Hyrum and others betrayed into the enemies' hands.... He heard General Clark in a speech say they would never see those prisoners again alive....

...In the following year, Jan. 1845, he was married to Mary Jane Emmett, and went with the Emmett Company up the Iowa River, crossed the Missouri River in the spring of 1846 and went to Council Bluffs and joined the Saints there.... They were blessed temporally and his sister Elizabeth Jane Pierce and husband, Enoch Burns, and the families of Brothers Simson Emmett, Edson Whipple joined Brother Wilford Woodruff's company and started for the Great Salt Lake valley June 16, 1850, where they arrived after many hardships October 10, 1850. They were directed to Ogden by Brother H. C. Kimball, under the presidency of Lorin Farr....

Brother Moffett was ordained a Seventy in the thirty-eighth quorum, after which he was ordained a High Priest in order to act as Counselor to Bishop Erastus Bingham. He served as clerk for the High Priests' quorum for several years, then as Counselor to Charles R. Dana, after whose death Brother L. Farr presided and chose Armstead Moffett as Counselor, which office he held up to his death.

...He moved up [to Ogden Valley] and, in company with Captain Hunt, erected a grist mill, which he sold. He then built two saw mills in company with Brothers Perry and Froerer, and with David Garner. In the fall of 1883 he went to Illinois and the surrounding States, for the purpose of getting genealogy, and on his return went to Logan remained there doing work for the dead until 1885, when he returned to the Eastern States for the purpose of gathering genealogy. On his return he moved to Logan city, where he remained and worked in the house of the Lord.... We can truthfully say of Bro. Moffett he was industrious, honest, temperate and faithful to the cause he espoused; he has been a man much blessed of God....

The deceased was the father of eighteen children and thirty-six grandchildren, to whom he set a good example, and whose temporal and eternal welfare he had diligently sought to promote.

"When Joseph went to Carthage to deliver himself up to the pretended requirements of the law, two or three days previous to his assassination, he said: 'I am going like a lamb to the slaughter; but I am calm as a summer's morning: I have a conscience void of offense towards God, and towards all men. I shall die innocent, and it shall vet be said of me—he was murdered in cold blood.'—The same morning, after Hyrum had made ready to go—shall it be said to the slaughter? yes, for so it was—he read the following paragraph, near the close of the twelfth chapter of Ether, in the Book of Mormon, and turned down the leaf upon it: "And it came to pass that I prayed unto the Lord that he would give unto the Gentiles

grace, that they might have charity. And it came to pass that the Lord said unto me: If they have not charity it mattereth not unto thee, thou hast been faithful; wherefore thy garments shall be made clean. And because thou hast seen thy weakness, thou shalt be made strong, even unto the sitting down in the place which I have prepared in the mansions of my Father. And now I ... bid farewell unto the Gentiles; yea, and also unto my brethren whom I love, until we shall meet before the judgment-seat of Christ, where all men shall know that my garments are not spotted with your blood. [Ether 12:36–38.] The testators are now dead, and their testament is in force."

Under the most stressful conditions or simply facing the little day to day challenges, fathers need all the help they can get and scripture will provide needed direction and comfort.







Pray for instruction, and like Nephi, you will be taught how to build your child:

"Now I, Nephi, did not work the timbers men; but I did build it after the manner which after the manner which was learned by men, neither did I build the ship after the manner of - 1 Nephi 18:2.

My friends and I were playing King of the Hill when a valuable boyhood lesson began to unfold.

A large dirt hill was our kingdom and each of us were trying to see how long we could obtain and then stay on the hill's top. Inevitably we would be pulled down from our throne by others trying to take our place.

A new kid to our neighborhood with red hair sat watching us from across the street. Someone in our group yelled "You can't

play with us!" He yelled back, "I wouldn't play with you even if you wanted me to!" A dirt clod was thrown at him and a rock was hurled towards us.

I never saw it coming. The rock hit me and opened a large cut next to the corner of my left eye. Someone said to me, "Go beat him up!" "I don't have to," I replied, then added "He'll get what he deserves," and I headed home. My worried mother helped patch me up.

A week later I came across this same red haired boy while riding my bike around the block. I stopped my bike when I saw his seriously injured face and asked what happened to him. He told me he had crashed his bike in the road. It was obvious from the large scrapes and scratches to one full side of his face that he had landed hard. Surprising myself, I said, "I guess you got what you deserved." And even more surprising, he replied, "I guess so."

Later, the thought came to me: *People who hurt you will get what they deserve and it will be much worse than you would ever want for them.* This thought took any remaining desire for personal revenge right out of my heart.

Fathers -- seek ways to teach your children the Golden Rule:

## Treat Others the Way You Want to Be Treated

#### To Turn or To Flee

The Savior said: "whosoever shall smite thee on thy right cheek, turn to him the other also." – Matthew 5:39. This noble virtue is embraced by those who believe if they "forgive" others, their own sins "shall be forgiven" – Luke 6:37. And, they seek to keep the "commandment" to "love one another; as I have loved you, that ye also love one another." – John 13:34

Turning the other cheek is always the correct counsel when you have been offended or sinned against. Remember it was Peter who asked Jesus: "Lord, how oft shall my brother sin against me, and I forgive him? till seven times? Jesus saith unto him, I say not unto thee, Until seven times: but, Until seventy times seven." – Matthew 18:21, 22

Perhaps the wisest advice is to completely avoid conflict if at all possible. As my grandfather used to say, "It's a slow pair of legs that lets your face get beat up." This practical advice not only helps prevent the need for forgiveness, it can also save us from a great deal of unwanted pain.

Lehi was commanded by the Lord to flee with his family from Jerusalem to avoid being murdered by wicked men. – <u>1 Nephi 2:1-4</u>. Joseph and Mary, did "flee into Egypt" to save the life of our Savior, Jesus Christ. – <u>Matthew 2:13-15</u>. Joseph, who was sold into Egypt, fled Potiphar's wife to avoid a great sin. – Genesis 39:7-12. Fleeing from sin is always a good idea.

We should flee when we can and forgive when we must. Ultimately, our heavenly reward is decided by the choices we make and not by the choices others make.

Put your plan in writing!

What are you planning to do?

When are you going to do it?
How are you going to accomplish your plan?
Where are you going to accomplish your plan?
Who is going to accomplish your plan with you?

The main points in effective planning are to THINK about what you want to do, ORGANIZE your thoughts, COMMUNICATE your plan, PREPARE WELL, and then MAKE IT HAPPEN!

# My Hero



Because my grandfather, Papa Brown, overcame the addictive power of alcohol and tobacco, he's my hero.

Papa worked for the railroad during the steam engine era and in spite of his dangerous and strenuous work, he wasn't paid much. On payday he would often spend his small salary drinking with his buddies and, more than once, he had his earnings stolen before he could even bring it home. He recalled: "No matter how drunk I got no one could ever steal my pocket watch from me."

During the winter, my mom, with her brother and two sisters, pulled a small wagon down to the railroad tracks where Papa's railroad buddies would sometimes throw coal from the train as it passed by their home. This extra coal kept their furnace from going out.

I was a young boy when Papa waved me to his side and said: "I want to tell you about an experience I had while standing where you were just standing. As I looked up into the sky, the clouds parted, and I saw the face of Jesus. When the clouds closed I walked into the kitchen, poured myself a shot [a small glass of alcohol], drank it, and said to my wife, that's my last drink." She said: "I'll believe that when I see it." Then, with added emotion, he said to me, "That was the last drink [of alcohol] I ever had."

These stories don't fully describe the Papa I knew. I've since come to understand how incredibly difficult it is to overcome destructive habits. Undoubtedly my grandfather's improved behavior, the giving up of alcohol and eventually tobacco, made him an easier person to live with. Certainly my grandmother deserves tremendous respect for holding their struggling little family together.

Because Papa was strong enough to change his life, my grandfather is my hero!

## Personal Development Activity



Try this simple test. Put your hand in one of your pockets and say to your hand, "You can't come out until I tell you." Then go about your regular activities for a few minutes. Did your hand come out of the pocket without permission? If so, try it again. Were you more successful controlling your body this time?

Breaking unnecessary or unwanted habits is both challenging and rewarding.

1<sup>st</sup> – Remember that you're in charge! Put your hand back in your pocket every once in a while to remind your body who's in charge.

2<sup>nd</sup> – Immediately begin a preplanned alternative behavior when an unwanted behavior comes to mind.

3<sup>rd</sup> - Don't give up! You will love who you are becoming.



Having faith in God will give your children a sense of accountability for how they live their life. Ultimately, justice, love, and mercy are only reconcilable through Christ and the commandment to "love one another" (John 13:34) can finally make sense.





Orienteering is a timed sport where participants use a map and compass to locate several control points and the designated finish. Topographical map reading, navigational skills, and personal fitness are required to be successful. The shortest distance between two points is frequently not the fastest or safest course to take. Obstructions such as rivers, lakes, and cliffs need to be identified and avoided. Trails, roads, and level clearings can often save valuable time. For safety reasons, all competitors are required to report to the finish whether they reached each control point or not.

Successful fathering is also a timed event. Children grow up quickly and need your leadership. As you race from point to point in your child's life, they need all the love and parenting skills you can provide. They are watching you run your fathering course in anticipation of running their own. The lessons learned and shared with them will magnify their success. For eternal reasons, all fathers will be required to report to their Maker whether they did their best in loving and caring for their children. Like the North Star, Jesus Christ is our immovable example, has already run the course, and knows the sure way. Follow Him.






